BACKGROUND

As part of Council's commitment to providing inclusive and accessible play for the community, the City of Canada Bay is proposing a \$300,000 upgrade to the playground in Queen Elizabeth Park, Concord. The upgrade will include new children's play equipment that will be integrated with the surrounding landscape to provide a unique play space for all ages.

This consultation sought input from the community to shape the initial playground design and determine which aspects of the current playground should be retained. Ideas and suggestions will be used to create the initial playground design which will be presented to the community for further feedback in April 2021.

This consultation ran from 14 December 2020 – 1 February 2021.



Collaborate reach

This consultation received 101 submissions from the community which consisted of 92 survey responses and 9 contributions to the virtual brainstorm.



The project page on Collaborate received 1,064 views from 509 visitors. Refer to appendix C for more information.

Social media reach

This consultation was promoted with 4 Facebook posts (1 boosted), 1 Instagram post, 1 Instagram story and 1 Twitter post. Collectively, these social media posts reached over 15,000 people and received 1,150 engagements. For more details refer to appendix B.

Social media posts were highly effective in driving traffic to the Collaborate page, with 51% of page visits attributed to social media (appendix D).

RESULTS

Community survey


The survey received 91 unique responses.

Respondent demographics

- 58% of respondents live in Concord
- 26% of respondents live on the border of the park (Addison Ave, Crane St, Broughton St or Gipps St Pitt St)
- 73% of respondents usually walk to the park

Equipment to retain from existing playground

- The swings and water pump were highlighted as the main aspects the community would like to retain in the space
- 77% of respondents stated the current facilities of the play area are inadequate
- 11% of respondents stated all equipment needs replacing and nothing should be retained




Most visited areas of the park

- The playground, sports fields and nature (turpentine/ironbark forest) were identified as the most visited areas of the park
- The memorial was the least visited area of the park

Preferred types of play

Respondents were asked to select up to 3 options from a list of 6 proposed types of play. Results show there is no clear preference from the community.

- All suggested types of play were supported, with imaginative play (cubbies or boats) the least desirable
- The top options were adventure play, motion play, nature play and climbing play



Surfacing


Play area surfacing was mentioned in a number of comments at the end of the survey.

- 8% of respondents were strongly against the inclusion of woodchips and sand as it is difficult and at times dangerous for younger children
- 4% of respondents highlighted rubber soft fall as their preferred surfacing

Play area suggestions

A number of suggestions were put forward for the play area. The most widely supported include:

- Providing adequate shade
- Making the playground accessible for people with a disability
- Providing play options suitable for a wide age range
- Inclusion of more seating and picnic tables



Other ideas suggested by 2 or more respondents are itemised below.

- Half basketball court
- Ensure there are more than 2 swings for mothers groups
- If slide is included do not use metal as it heats up on warmer days

Virtual brainstorm

The virtual brainstorm received 9 contributions and 7 upvotes. Much of the feedback echoed that of the survey as 7 of the 9 contributors also provided feedback through the survey.

Suggestions mentioned by 2 or more respondents are itemised below.

- Dinosaur or animal themed playground with fun facts and educational materials about extinct animals
- Trampolines in the ground
- Mini soccer park that can be used as a basketball/netball court

Feedback via phone/email

The Project Lead received feedback from one resident via phone. This resident suggested increased seating and inclusion of fitness equipment in the space.

CONCLUSION

The community is excited about this upgrade and would like the play space to cater for children of all ages and abilities, including teenagers. The community supports retaining the existing water pump and swings and is interested in a range of play options including adventure play, motion play and water play.

Accessibility and safety were highlighted as key issues and there was strong support for adequate shade options and fencing along the side of the park bordering Gipps Street. It is also suggested that more picnic tables and chairs are included in the space and that rubber soft fall is used over mulch.
