BACKGROUND

In February 2021, Council received a petition from residents in Chiswick requesting that Wire Mill Park be investigated as a potential off-leash dog park. In response to this petition, Council undertook community consultation from 12 April to 5 May 2021 to understand the sentiment of residents.

This report outlines the findings from the community consultation which will assist Council to reach a decision regarding the future of the space.

CONSULTATION METHODS

- Collaborate survey
- Feedback via paper forms at drop-in session
- Feedback via phone and email

NOTIFICATION METHODS

The following methods were implemented to notify the community of this consultation:

CONSULTATION SUMMARY

Collaborate reach

- 708 page views
- 523 unique site visitors
- 40 people following the project for updates

Social media reach

This consultation was promoted via the following Council social media channels:

- 2 x Facebook posts
- 1 x Instagram post
- 1 x Instagram story
- 1 x Twitter post

Collectively, these social posts reached 6,649 people and achieved 516 engagements (post likes, comments and shares). See appendix B for more details.

RESULTS

Community survey

The community survey received 289 responses and aimed to answer the following questions:


- Does the community support this proposal? (why/why not)
- What are the main concerns?
- Do dog owners make use of the off-leash area at Lysaght Park? (why/why not)

Respondent demographics

- 47% live in the Riviera apartments or another apartment overlooking the park
- 30% live in the Canada Bay area
- 66% visit the park to exercise/walk
- 56% visit the park to walk their dog

Support for proposal

- Yes 49.83%
- No 50.17%




Reasons for/against

Respondents were presented with a list of statements and asked to select all statements they agree with. More than 40% of respondents selected the following options:

- "Wire Mill Park should be available for everyone to use" (56%)
- "Creating an off-leash area will activate the site and increase exercise and socialising opportunities for dogs and people alike" (46%)
- "Wire Mill Park is great as it is, it doesn't need to change" (43%)
- "I have concerns about dogs being off-leash around children" (43%)
- "Formalising this space as an off-leash dog area just makes sense, as it's already being used as one" (41%)



Use of Lysaght Park

132 responses answered this question, 62% of which stated they don't take their dog to the off-leash area at Lysaght Park. The main reasons sighted were:

- The area is not safe for dogs as it is unfenced and there is passing traffic (35%)
- Too far to walk compared to Wire Mill Park (8%)
- Didn't know Lysaght Park was an off-leash dog park (4%)



Additional feedback

Respondents were asked to provide any additional feedback or comments on the proposal. 161 respondents answered this question and results are summarised below.

For:

- An off-leash area would foster a greater sense of community (7%)
- Wire Mill Park is a safe area for dogs to be off-leash as it is isolated and the water creates a natural barrier (4%)
- Dog owners in this area are responsible, they clean up after their dogs and won't take them off-leash if it's not safe for other dogs or people (5%)
- Dogs in the area live in apartments and need to socialise (2%)

Against:

- It is not safe for children and elderly residents to have dogs off-leash (16%)
- Dogs off-leash harass people walking/running along in the park (14%)
- The park will become too busy (12%)
- Cleanliness (10%)
- The park should remain as is (7%)
- Some dogs are scared/intimidated by dogs off-leash (2%)
- The area is not suitable and other locations in the vicinity should be considered (2%)

Other feedback:

- If made an off-leash area, it needs to be fenced (7%)
- Designated off-leash hours should be introduced (4%)
- Fencing will ruin the visual amenity of the park (3%)
- If made an off-leash area, more facilities are needed such as bins and taps (2%)
- Other locations in the vicinity should be considered as they are more appropriate for an off-leash area (2%)

Drop-in session

Council officers were at Wire Mill Park on Wednesday 21 April from 5-6:30pm to talk to residents about this consultation and gather further feedback. Approximately 40 members of the community were present at the park during this time period.

Feedback collected was input into the online survey to collate results:

- Two pieces of written feedback submitted
- 9 hard copy surveys completed

Feedback via phone/email

Council officers received 17 emails providing feedback on this proposal. Of these:

- Two were in support of the proposal
- 15 were against

The main reasons noted for opposing the proposal were:

- Safety concerns for children and elderly residents who walk along the foreshore and/or have picnics in the park (10)
- The park will become too crowded (3)

Other feedback included:

- An off-leash area would disturb the tranquillity of the park
- The off-leash area at Lysaght Park is close by
- The number of dogs in the park increased greatly due to COVID-19 and there has been a reduction in numbers this year. Council should delay this proposal by 12 months to see if things settle.
- The area should be trialled as an off-leash area and closely monitored

CONCLUSION

This consultation did not yield clear results. The community is divided as to whether Wire Mill Park should become a designated off-leash area and there are strong views for and against.

Those in support of the proposal believe Council should formalise the space as an off-leash area as it is already being used as one regularly and it would activate the site and foster a greater sense of community. Those opposed to the proposal have concerns about the safety risk of having dogs off-

leash in an area that is frequented by children and residents of a nearby nursing home. While some residents believe establishing a fenced off-leash area may mitigate this risk, it has also been raised that fencing will ruin the visual amenity of the area.

It is important to note that the off-leash area at Lysaght Park (500m from Wire Mill Park) is not frequented by many dog owners in the area, in large part due to safety concerns as it is not fenced and there is regular passing traffic.
